# III. The group brainstormed a list of activities they could do that would be useful to them:

- 1. Host a Children's Environmental Health Summit: not **just** research-based—solutions, policy, and prevention. HT, AB, MY, CS, LY, RB, SG, AG?, GG, JK agreed to work on this. Consider contacting Katie Frevert? What would the reach be...Region 10 EPA? Note that EPA has done regular Children's Environmental Health conferences (often with the local PEHSU's). Rob Banes suggested the spring of 2009 since it could be scheduled adjacent to the EPA Region 10 Partners Meeting and someone from our group could also submit a talk there.
- 2. Send a rep to ongoing Seattle meetings of the National Children's Study.

- 3. Raise awareness of issues related to impacts on young children's environmental health. Example: Conference.
- 4. Send internal e-mail alerts on hot topics of interest.
- 5. Create a catalogue of what we all do in the form of a matrix. Post it on the CHE-WA website. State what each of us **can** contribute from our organization.
- 6. Share projects amongst each other to find help/solutions. Ex. Find a way to get more information about children's environmental health (CEH) to Seattle Midwifery School (insert into curriculum? Do a Continuing Medical Education training?)
- 7. Develop a CEH speakers' bureau.
- 8. Coordinate with Dept. of Ecology's Toxics Reduction for Children Conference currently in the planning stage.
- 9. Get CEH information out to the public.
- 10. Provide people (from our group) to speak on CEH at **other** conferences
- 11. Attend **other** conferences
- 12. Come up with ways to make scientific research available to the public

## IV. The group also raised the following questions to answer in the future:

- 1. Clarify somehow: what will each of us get out of this group?
- 2. Are we proactive or reactive? Who establishes priorities?
- 3. Are we a resource only? And/or a spokesperson?
- 4. Ask ourselves: who are we targeting? This will influence our reach.

### V. Conclusions and Agreements

The group...

- 1. reviewed and revised the draft Mission and Goals Statement (see working draft attached)
- 2. suggested a possible need for an overarching Vision Statement
- 3. agreed to meet monthly at King County Hazardous Waste Office. (NOTE: meetings will be on the second Thursday of each month from 9:30-11:30)
- 4. committed to work on a children's environmental health conference/summit. The following people agreed to work on this: Rob Banes, Aimee Boulanger, Gail Gensler, Aileen Gagney (?), Steve Gilbert, Jeff Ketchel, Cynthia Shurtleff, Heather Trim, Margo Young, Leena Der Yuen,
- 5. confirmed that they would like Gensler to continue to send bundled, e-mail alerts on 'hot topics'
- 6. agreed to work on assembling a resource catalog/matrix of our own organizations, and proposed posting it on CHE-WA's website

### VI. Assigned tasks

- 1. Confirm regular meeting schedule and send with 3-25-08 notes. (Gensler)
- 2. Develop a matrix template and send to group participants. (Gensler/Berg/Draper)

3. Send completed matrix back to Gensler/Berg/or Draper. (Group participants)
